This week – We continue our lessons teaching us about how to live now, anticipating Heaven.

The Lord, He it is that doth go before thee; He will be with thee, He will not fail thee, neither forsake thee, fear not, neither be dismayed. Deuteronomy 31v8.

Important Thought for us Today: Most people desire to go to Heaven when they die. A good desire - but the devil deceives many into believing that Christ has died for everyone and therefore all will go to Heaven regardless of their sin, or whether they repent, or not. Yet Heaven is God's and He sets the rules for entry. As God is holy, so too is Heaven. To keep it eternally holy He can only accept in those who are perfectly holy. As there are none without sin, how can anyone enter?

See 1 John 1v8-10. We read in John 3v16, "For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever <u>believeth</u> in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life".

Romans 5v8 tells us, "But God commendeth His love toward us, in that, while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us". God's holy wrath at our sin was fully satisfied when Jesus Christ (the sinless one) suffered Hell for us on Calvary. He did not die for everyone - only for those who repent of their sin

suffered Hell for us on Calvary. He did not die for everyone - only for those who repent of their sin and trust in Him. Once forgiven and clothed in His righteousness only then can we enter Heaven.

Hymn 618 - speaking of the joy of Heaven set before us when we know Christ as Saviour.

 Be calm anxious spirit, the worst that can come
 But shortens the journey, and hastens me home.
